The present building was begun in August, 1922 and completed in 1929. The Ernest M. Skinner organ, dedicated in 1929, reflected the influence of G. Donald Harrison, who had come in 1927 from the Willis firm in England to work for Skinner in Boston. From 1968 to 1970 the organ underwent tonal redesign and rebuilding by the Berkshire Organ

The carillon was a gift of the Moses family in 1928. It came from the English bell-founders, John Taylor and Company. There are now 48 playing bells. It is used regularly before church services and in summer concerts.

In this building, new in 1874, was placed E. & G. G. Hook & Hastings' pipe organ, Opus 781, of which the casework and ornamented façade pipes remain in place today. This pipe organ underwent many rebuildings — in 1894 by J. W. Steere & Son Organ Company, in 1909 by E. M. Skinner, in 1926 by the Skinner Organ Company, in 1952 by the Albert E. Carter Organ Company. In 1971 a completely new instrument by Austin Organs was installed and is in place today.

THE MUNICIPAL CAMPANILE

The Municipal Chime at the top of the Campanile tower, 300 feet above the street, comprises twelve bells, and was installed in 1913. The striking action has more recently been electrified. The lowest bell, an E-flat, weighs 3200 pounds. The smallest bell, a G-natural, one and a third octaves higher, weighs 225 pounds. They were cast at the Meneely Bell Foundry in Troy, New York.

The first church on this site housed a three-manual tracker organ, Opus 125 of George S. Hutchings. Ernest M. Skinner, as an employee of Hutchings, was involved in the rebuilding of this instrument in 1893 and again in 1905 and 1910, under his own name. The building and organ were destroyed by fire in 1919. The present building dates from 1920, and contains Opus 322 of the Skinner Organ Company. The instrument remains unaltered tonally, and is now being restored to original condition by Messrs. Czelusniak et Dugal, Inc.



The one-manual Steere & Turner pipe organ of 1874, installed first in an earlier, smaller building, was moved to the present stone edifice in 1889. It has undergone tonal redesign and additions by Berkshire Organ Company in 1969. The fate of this organ hinges upon the deteriorating condition of the original windchests and the considerable expense of the necessary repairs to those antique parts. Some basic mechanical renovations have already been executed by William Baker & Company. This building, seating 2200, is the largest church in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield.

In 1895, this parish purchased the first Casavant organ, Opus 63, to be sold in the United States. When the present church was occupied in 1923, the organ was brought from an earlier building. In 1942 a new organ was amalgamated from parts of the Casavant organ, a Hall organ, and other materials. A new organ was contracted for in 1977 with Theodore Gilbert and Associates, utilizing as many resources as possible from the old instrument. An ancillary division of the organ and a second console are located near the sanctuary. This instrument was dedicated in 1982.

Membership in the Guild is open to any interested individual upon application through a chapter. The American Guild of Organists is a not-for-profit, tax-exempt organization, chartered in 1896 by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York.





General Convention Information

Please read the following paragraphs carefully before completing your registration forms. Written acknowledgement of your registration, if received by June 10, 1987, will be sent to you by mail. You should bring this confirmation with you to the convention and present it to the Registration Desk.

There are three parts to your registration: I REGISTRATION FORM, II WORKSHOP/PROGRAM CHOICES, and III REQUEST FOR DORMITORY HOUSING. Complete at least the first two, and the third only if you wish dormitory housing. An accompanying spouse must fill out a separate registration form.

Even if you have completed and mailed the Early Registration Form in February or April, 1987 issues of THE AMERICAN ORGANIST, you must fill in and return to the Registrar the forms for REGISTRATION, WORKSHOP/PROGRAM CHOICES, and REQUEST FOR DORMITORY HOUSING (if desired) contained in this Program Booklet. In 1972 this instrument was given tonal redesign and additions by the Berkshire Organ Company. The renovated organ was inaugurated by Charles Page in 1973.

This handsome building was completed in 1877. Its first pipe organ, installed in 1918, was built by La Compagnie d'Orgues Canadiennes, Ltee. Between 1973 and 1983 Theodore Gilbert & Associates restructured the instrument to bring it into line with contemporary tonal expectations and to provide resources appropriate to the execution of the organ literature. The high barrel-vault ceiling, together with the absence of any absorptive materials in the spacious room, contribute to an outstanding acoustical setting.

REGISTERING AT THE CONVENTION: If you arrive without having registered in advance, please be prepared to pay for Daily or complete Registration with a check or money order. No cash will be accepted. Tickets to individual concerts will be available to the general public and will be sold at the door at the time of the concert subject to availability. (There is no charge for the Festival Service.) WORKSHOPS: Workshops will be assigned on a first-registered basis. Please be sure to indicate second and third choices on your WORKSHOP/PROGRAM CHOICES form so that we may reassign you if your first choice is full.

BADGES: Admission to all Convention events and transportation will be by badge. You must wear your badge at all times. Badges will be given out at Registration Desk upon your arrival.

The five locations in which the four-day program of the Convention will take place - Springfield, Westfield, Holyoke and South Hadley, Massachusetts and Enfield, Connecticut - are rich in historical sites, panoramic scenery, museums of Art and Science and exhibits of natural phenomena ranging from dinosaur tracks to the fish ladder in the Connecticut River.

In 1986, Springfield celebrated the 350th anniversary of its founding. It is the third largest city in Massachusetts, supporting innumerable churches, many of which possess fine examples of modern pipe organs. Home to the outstanding Springfield Symphony Ochestra, it also boasts a resident theater, Stage West. Sports fans will wish to visit the newly erected Basketball Hall of Fame on the east bank of the Connecticut River.

The Art and Music Department of the Springfield City Library houses a collection of 35,000 books, 10,000 musical scores and 25,000 recordings, with a splendid reference collection. Here convention goers may visit a special exhibit relating to organ building in Springfield and vicinity, notably the Johnson and Steere Organ Cos.

The Library forms one side of Springfield's Quadrangle (where several Convention events will take place) Christ Church Cathedral a second, while four museums close in a large treeshaded green. Al fresco luncheons at the Quad Cafe are available all summer.

Tremolo

On September 29, 1860, the Feast of Saint Michael, the cornerstone of this church was set. The first pipe organ in the new building was E. & G. G. Hook's Opus 309, the wooden casework of which remains in place today. In 1929 this instrument was replaced by a Casavant pipe organ. As part of the renovation work on the Cathedral in 1966, the organ was rebuilt by Berkshire Organ Company. Since 1982 the organ has been undergoing a complete rebuilding and the stoplist has been redesigned by Theodore Gilbert & Associates. When all divisions of the instrument are completed, this will be the largest pipe organ in western Massachusetts.



This building houses two pipe organs of completely different styles and periods. The first was Opus 436 of George S. Hutchings, 1898. It was twice rebuilt and enlarged by Ernest M. Skinner, first in 1922, and then in 1938. The pipework is chambered to the left of the sanctuary. It is undergoing a process of complete restoration by William Baker & Company.

Dedicated in 1985, the C.B. Fisk tracker-action pipe organ, located in the gallery, is of neo-classical design. The several double-draw stops are typical of Fisk construction. As tonal accessories, it has a Glockenspiel of tuned bells, a Nachtigal created by pipes speaking into water, and Tympani, created by the simultaneous winding of five open wood pipes of close pitch.

Seven miles west of Springfield, on the Westfield River, a tributary of the Connecticut, lies the attractive city of Westfield, settled in 1669. Its historical museum contains, as well as colonial and late 18th century New England memorabilia, a unique whip collection, testimony to a thriving industry in whip manufacture which existed from 1800 to circa 1920. Westfield is still known as the "Whip City."

Westfield was in the nineteenth century a center of pipe-organ building activity. It was the home of William A. Johnson and his son William H., builders of 860 pipe organs of the highest quality between 1844 and 1898. Their firm employed nearly 70 men at its peak of production. Dozens of these instruments are still in active use, many in western Massachusetts.

From the Johnson factory and its highly-skilled workmen sprang the firms of Steere and Turner, later J. W. Steere & Co., and also Emmons Howard. at one time Ernest M. Skinner conducted some of his organ-building operations in Westfield.

A major attraction to summer visitors is Stanley Park in the western section of the city. Here, every June, over fifty varieties of roses bloom on twenty-five hundred plantings. Other charming features are scattered throughout: a large fountain, a Japanese foot carillon tower with 86 British and Flemish bells. Summer concerts include orchestral, band and singing groups.

North from Springfield a short distance on highway 91 is the city of Holyoke. A view of this skyline would remind the visitor of some old European city because of the number of church spires visible on the horizon. The fifty-seven foot drop here of the Connecticut River created a natural site for an industrial center. Holyoke was known first for its textile mills and later, as the textile industry moved south, as the Paper City of America.

A fine Skinner organ is housed in the Second Congregational Church (1919) where the Thomas Murray concert will take place. Attached to the church is an extremely beautiful chapel, the gift of Joseph A. Skinner, a resident silk mill owner.

Holyoke's Heritage State Park in the center of the city offers a place to relax, picnic, or visit the two-story exhibit of Holyoke's colorful past. The Heritage Park railroad will transport the visitor to a covered shopping mall. An amusement park located on the shoulder of Holyoke's guardian mountain, Mt. Tom, offers a pleasant summer's entertainment, and the famous Mt. Tom Ski Area in summer offers an Alpine Slide.

Four miles from Holyoke, still hugging the bank of the Connecticut River, is the town of South Hadley, whose first settlers built homesteads as early as 1690. At the First Congregational Church, in early days, a conch horn served the practical purpose of letting the church members know, fifteen minutes before service, that no Indians were in sight. And though church goers are now presumably safe from this threat, a fine musical G bell sounds the all clear every Sunday morning.

Adjacent to the town green is the campus of Mt. Holyoke College, with its beautiful landscaping and fine buildings, which will be home to the convention goers during their four-day stay. Its Gothic style Abbey Chapel contains in E. M. Skinner organ, and the recently installed C. B. Fisk organ, opus 84.

Extra curricular diversions might include use of the fine athletic facilities, visits to the Mt. Holyoke College art museum and greenhouses, to the Skinner Museum, to the Emily Dickinson House in Amherst (10 miles north), or to the campus of Smith College in Northampton (7 miles northwest) where there is not only a fine art museum, but a carillon in College Hall Tower. The bells were cast at the same foundry, Whitechapel's of London, which cast the Liberty Bell.

The colleges of Smith, Mt. Holyoke, Hampshire, Amherst, and the University of Massachusetts, all near neighbors in the valley, comprise the Five Colleges, and are associated in many academic, cultural and recreational programs.

South of Springfield, just over the border in Connecticut, is the town of Enfield, where that fiery preacher, Jonathan Edwards, delivered a famous sermon: "Sinners in the hands of an angry God". Enfield possesses one of the best-preserved examples of an old New England white clap-board, steepled church. A near neighbor, the Church of St. Adalbert, where a 1986 British J. W. Walker instrument is installed, will be host to one of the Convention recitals.

Is The Church/Temple Musician Becoming Extinct? (221)





The Pedal Harpsichord: Fact, Fiction, or Fantasy? (421)



Organs of the World: England and New England (320)



YELLA PESSL


Panel: First Woman of the Harpsichord






THOMAS MURRAY

Recital; Lemare And The Transcriber's Art (310)



Widely known for his interpretations of Romantic music, his recordings of the finest remaining nineteenth century American organs or AFKA, Sheffield and Nonesuch labels are highly acclaimed. Organ Scholar, Canterbury Cathedral Choir




DANIEL E. GAWTHROP Winner, Choral Competition



David Dahl, MM, AAGO, is Associate Professor of Music and University Organist at Pacific Lutheran University, as well as Director of Music at Christ Church Parish, Episcopal, Tacoma, Washington. Mr. Dahl's interests and studies include historic organs, performance practice and liturgical improvisation. In 1985 the award-winning recording *J.S. Bach and the Choral* was released, with David Dahl as organist.



ALAN DURFEE

Carillonneur

Alan Durfee has studied carillon with Peter Bakker and Todd Fair at the Netherlands Carillon School in Amersfoort, Holland. A mathematician on the Mount Holyoke College faculty, he attends international conferences where he pursues his interest in historic keyboard instruments by searching out special organs to see and to play. He is also an organist and harpsichordist.



LYNN EDWARDS

Dietrich Buxtehude On His 350th Anniversary (101)

Lynn Edwards, a native of Canada, has specialized in the Renaissance and Baroque repertory for keyboard instruments. With the support of the Canada Council she spent two years in Germany, France and Italy studying Baroque performance practices and playing surviving antique organs from the fifteenth to the eighteenth centuries. She is president and cofounder of The Westfield Center for Early Keyboard Studies and is a concert performer and lecturer.







THE CHOIR OF CANTERBURY CATHEDRAL

The Canterbury Cathedral Choir consists of eighteen boys and twelve men who sing daily services in the ancient church, considered the mother church of England by Anglicans throughout the world. The boys live in a former monastic building close to the cathedral, which they attend every day to rehearse and to sing the services.

The music which is sung is drawn from the earliest plainsong and polyphony to the music of living composers, and although the bulk of the repertoire is by British composers, much music by the great composers of Europe is performed. The tradition of daily performance means that the singers must be proficient in the art of sight-reading in addition to possessing voices of high quality. The organist is also executive director and conductor of the choir, and has a deputy who is able to fulfill his functions.






Coda Party





During the spring of 1986, our company relocated Casavant Frères, Ltée. Opus 2932, 3 manuals, 40 ranks, built in 1967 for the Cranwell School, Lenox, Mass., and redesigned the organ for installation in the sanctuary of Blessed Sacrament R.C. Church, Greenfield, Mass., as pictured at the right. The action is electropneumatic; the original low wind pressures and voicing remain intact, the concept of Lawrence I. Phelps at Casavant.

During the summer of 1985, we restored the 4 manual, electro-pneumatic console of E.M. Skinner Opus 322, 1920, 6 divisions, 70 ranks, in the Second Congregational Church, Holyoke, Mass. More recently, the Choir division, including Harp unit, was restored in full, and our work will continue until the entire organ has been returned to pristine condition.



During 1985, our firm rebuilt completely the c.1924 tubular-pneumatic pipe organ by La Compagnie d'Orgues Canadiennes, Ltée. at the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary R.C. Church, Chicopee, Mass. The new instrument comprises 22 ranks on 2 manuals and Pedal, electro-pneumatic action with solid-state console, combinations, and relays, and represents the tonal ideal of our company.

Other instruments of note under our regular care include the 1959 Holtkamp organ, Opus 1716, 2m, 17r, electro-pneumatic action, and unaltered 1933 G.D. Harrison AEolian-Skinner organ, Opus 911, 3m, 55r, both at Amherst College; the 1910/15 Austin Opus 279/618, 4m, 60r, and the 1956/61 AEolian-Skinner Opus 1295/A, 3m, 40r, both at Smith College, Northampton; the 1922 Casavant Frères Opus 927, 2m, 12r, maintaining tubular-pneumatic action, in the Sacred Heart R.C. Church, Northampton; and the 1936 E.M. Skinner & Son, Methuen, Mass. organ, Opus 507, 3m, 42r in the First Church of Christ, Congregational, Northampton. This Skinner was the first major project from the Methuen factory, and the organ retains the case, façade, and some pipework from the 1889 Johnson tracker previously serving the Church.



During the summer of 1984, our company completed the meticulous historical restoration of the William A. Johnson tracker organ, Opus 54, 1856, 1 manual, 7 ranks, in the Trinitarian Congregational Church at Montague Center, Mass., pictured at the left. The Organ Historical Society lists this instrument as the oldest Johnson organ which remains unaltered, and our work was carefully planned to maintain that distinction.

During the summer of 1983, we relocated the Johnson & Son tracker organ, Opus 838, 1896, 2 manuals, 13 ranks, from the Northampton State Hospital to the Holyoke, Mass., Community College, where the instrument was carefully cleaned,

repaired, reconstructed, and regulated in its original state and voice. The preservation of this typical New England pipe organ, built originally in Westfield, Mass., has also afforded the College a notable basis for the expansion of its music curriculum.

During 1979, our firm renovated the Pomplitz & Company tracker organ, Number 214, c.1875, 2 manuals, 16 ranks, in the Village Congregational Church, Cummington, Mass., including the restoration of the solid black walnut casework. This instrument, built originally in Baltimore, Maryland, had been relocated with alterations to the Cummington Church from Trinity Protestant Episcopal Church, Staunton, Virginia, in 1903 by Emmons Howard of Westfield, Mass. It is believed to be the only Pomplitz organ in New England.

Since their installation in 1976, the three mechanical-action pipe organs in the Fine Arts Center of the University of Massachusetts at Amherst have been under the exclusive care of this firm. The concert instrument is 3 manuals and 66 ranks plus Glockenspiel, with electric stop and combination action. The recital instrument is 2 manuals and 23 ranks with mechanical action throughout, and the practice organ is 2 manuals and 14 ranks. All three were built by the firm of Gebr. Oberlinger Orgelbau, Windesheim, West Germany; most open fluework is cone-tuned.
