RONALD STALFORD has been Organist and Choirmaster of All Saints Church, Worcester, Massachusetts since 1979. Prior to that he held a similar position at Christ Church in Georgetown. Washington, D.C. In 1967 he was made a Fellow of the College of Church Musicians at the Washington Cathedral where he studied with Paul Callaway, Preston Rockholt and Leo Sowerby. Here he worked intensely on the music of Sowerby and became his close pupil and friend. Mr. Stalford collaborated with musicians throughout the country and organized the observance of the centennial of Sowerby's birth, May 1, 1895. He is vice- president of the Leo Sowerby Foundation.

JOSEPH P. SWAIN is Musical Director of Tapestry, a singing ensemble of twelve singers dedicated to a cappella literature. He holds degrees from Dartmouth and Harvard, and is Associate Professor of music at Colgate University where he plays viola with the Colgate Concert Orchestra and the Colgate Chamber Music Society. His book, The Broadway Musical: a Critical Survey, received the Deems Taylor Award for excellence in writing about music from ASCAP.

PETER SYKES is Director of Music at the First Church in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and Chairman of the Early Music Department and instructor in keyboard instruments and chamber music at the Longy School of Music. He was a winner of New England Conservatory's Chadwick Medal, the Boston Chamber AGO Competition, the 1986 SEHKS harpsichord competition and is the 1993 laureate of the Erwin Bodky Award for excellence in the performance of early music. He has appeared with Ensemble Project Arts Nova and toured with Musica Antiqua Köln. Mr. Sykes has recorded on the AKFA, Centaur, Northeastern, Telarc, and Titanic labels.

TAPESTRY - the All-Centuries Singers was established in Clinton, New York in 1985 bringing together twelve singers of varying occupations, musical training and choral experiences. Their common interest was to perform fine a cappella compositions. Tapestry has established a reputation not only for their command of choral chamber music, but also for their use of early instruments, poetic introductions and bright costumes in which they present performances of renaissance madrigals.

HASKELL THOMSON is Professor of Organ and director of the Division of Keyboard Studies at Oberlin College Conservatory of Music where he has taught for more than 30 years. A recital artist as well as a church musician, he has performed in some of the world's most magnificent churches, cathedrals and universities including Westminster Abbey, the Bern Cathedral, Queen's College Chapel, Oxford, St. Francois de Sales, Lyon, and Rockefeller Chapel, Chicago. Mr. Thomson holds degrees from Oberlin and Yale and has studied French improvisation techniques with André Marchal, the North German organ tradition as a recipient of a Fulbright grant, and the French Cavaille-Coll organ tradition of the 19th century under a McCandless grant.

PAUL WILLIAM TINGLEY, a former trumpet performance major, has studied with several artists from American orchestras including Charles Daval, Steve Emory and Charles Schluetter of the Boston Symphony, Phil Smith and George Coble of the New York Philharmonic, and Dana Russian of Beacon Brass and the Springfield Symphony. As the director of the Gloriae Dei Brass Ensemble, Mr. Tingley has recorded and toured with the internationally acclaimed choir Gloriae Dei Cantores in 22 countries in Eastern and Western Europe and North America. He is also the assistant conductor of the 104 member Spirit of America marching, concert and field band, and the Music Editorial Assistant for the sacred music division of Paraclete Press.























PENNA ROSE has been Director of the Berkshire Bach Society for four years. She is Director of Chapel Music at Princeton University and conductor of the choir at Union Theological Seminary. She has served as assistant conductor of the New York Choral Society and Music Director at First Congregational Church in Stockbridge, Massachusetts. For several years she was musical director of many Broadway shows in and around New York including the FANTASTICS. During the summer she continues this occupation at the Theater Barn in New Lebanon, New York.

ANGELA RICCARADO SALCEDO is Organ Professor at the University of Connecticut as well as the Director of Music at the Storrs Congregational Church. In 1995 she was one of twenty-five organists chosen throughout the country to compete in the National Young Players Competition. She has performed on the summer evening concert series at Old West Church, Boston. An active member of the AGO, Ms. Salcedo organized the first National Organ Competition for high school students, the *L. Cameron-Johnson Memorial Organ Competition*. She earned degrees from New England Conservatory of Music, the University of Cincinnati, and further studies include participation in the 1988 Academy of Italian Organ Music, Pistoia, Italy.

JOHN W. W. SHERER is Organist and Director of Music at Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago where he directs two adult choirs including a twenty-eight voice professional choir. He supervises a year-round concert series, an annual Festival of the Arts, and performs recitals throughout the country. A native of Xenia, Ohio, Mr. Sherer is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He received a German language certificate from the Goethe Institute in Munich and has earned two master's degrees at Yale majoring in Organ Performance and Art in Religion. His organ studies have been with David Mulbury, Roberta Gary, Walden Moore, Gerre Hancock and Thomas Murray. Currently he is enrolled in a doctoral program at the Juilliard School of Music where he studies with John Weaver.

VICTORIA R. SIROTA is Vicar of Church of the Holy Nativity in Baltimore. She holds degrees from Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Boston University and Harvard Divinity School, and was a postdoctoral fellow at the Bunting Institute of Radcliffe College. The Reverend Dr. Sirota has served on the faculties of Yale Divinity School, Yale Institute of Sacred Music and Boston University. Her publications include "An Exploration of Music as Theology" in *Theological Education* (Autumn 1994). She was the coordinator of the 1990 National Convention of the AGO in Boston and served as a consultant for the 1996 National AGO Centennial Convention in New York.

PATRICIA SNYDER is Director of Music at Pakachoag Church, Auburn, Massachusetts, and is a member of the faculty (organ and piano) at Pakachoag Community Music School. She has taught at the College of Holy Cross and Andover-Newton Theological School. Ms. Snyder is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario and Yale University. She was awarded the Premier Prix and Prix d'Excellence from the Conservatoire National de Rueil-Malmaison, France, where she studied with Marie-Claire Alain. She performs regularly in England, Canada and the United States and has concertized in Europe and Japan. Ms. Snyder is Director of ConVivium, a 22 voice professional choral ensemble based in Worcester, Massachusetts.

DAVID SPICER is Minister of Music at First Church of Christ in Wethersfield, Connecticut, where he directs a multiple vocal and handbell choir program and produces a monthly concert series. Prior to assuming the Wethersfield position in 1986, he served churches in Lincoln, Nebraska, and Wayne, Pennsylvania and taught church music at Nebraska Wesleyan University. Mr. Spicer is a graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music where he was an Artist-Scholar under Dr. Alexander McCurdy. Graduate studies were completed at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. He is dedicated to the idea that Christianity and music can effectively merge to wash away "the dust of everyday life" from our souls.

Prior to assuming his current positions he served parishes in Massachusetts, New York, and Kentucky. He is a former dean of the Central New York and the Saint Lawrence River Chapters of the AGO.

ANN HOWARD JONES is Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Boston University where she conducts the Symphonic Chorus, Chamber Chorus and the Women's Chorale, teaches advanced choral conducting, and administers the M.M. program. She is the Choral Conductor of the Boston University Tanglewood Institute, and serves as Assistant Conductor for Choruses with the Atlanta Symphony. She conducts the Atlanta Symphony Youth Chorus and serves as Musical Assistant with the Robert Shaw Chamber Singers and Festival Singers. Dr. Jones holds bachelors and masters degrees in voice and a doctorate in choral conducting from the University of Iowa. 

JAMES DAVID CHRISTE was the first American to win the International Organ Competition in Bruges, Belgium, and the first person in the history of the competition to win both the first prize and the "Prize of the Audience." Mr. Christie received a B.Mus. degree from Oberlin Conservatory of Music and a master's degree and Artist's Diploma from New England Conservatory of Music. He has performed throughout the United States, Canada and Europe and has been a frequent soloist with orchestras including the Boston, Baltimore, and Springfield Symphonies, the Boston Pops, and the Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Christie serves on the faculties of the Boston Conservatory, Wellesley College, and Holy Cross (Worcester) where he is Distinguished Artist-in-Residence and College Organist.

ANDREW CLARKE is Organist and Choirmaster of Riverside Presbyterian Church in Jacksonville, Florida. Prior to his duties in Florida he taught organ improvisation at the Institute of Sacred Music at Yale University and organ at Williams College. Mr. Clarke has been on the faculties of Jacksonville University and Florida Community College. A native of Pittsfield, Massachusetts, he is a graduate of Yale and New England Conservatory of Music and did advanced organ study in Holland. As an organ recitalist he has toured in the United States and Canada including recitals at Tanglewood and at the Spoleto Festival (Charleston). He has presented master classes on improvisation for many AGO chapters and regional conventions.

RAY CORNILS is Municipal Organist for the City of Portland, Maine, where he presides over the Kotzschmar Memorial Organ in Portland City Hall Auditorium. He is Music Director of the First Parish Church in Brunswick, Maine, and a member of the music faculties of Bowdoin College and the University of Southern Maine. Mr. Cornils received a B.Mus. degree from Oberlin Conservatory and the M.Mus. from New England Conservatory of Music. He has concertized throughout the United States and has performed in Germany and Russia. Mr. Cornils is a member of the National Committee on Professional Relations of the AGO, a past dean of the Portland, Maine Chapter, a past sub-dean of the Boston Chapter, and former Region I Councillor for Professional Concerns.

THOMAS DAY is the author of *Why Catholics Can't Sing* and *Where Have You Gone Michelangelo: the Loss and Soul in Catholic Culture.* He attended Catholic schools in the Philadelphia area, earned a Ph.D. in Musicology at Columbia University, and was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Munich in Germany. Since 1978 Mr. Day has taught music at Salve Regina University, Newport, Rhode Island.

MARY ANN DODD was named University Organist *Emerita* in 1993 following a twenty-year tenure as University Organist and Special Instructor in Organ at Colgate University. She has also taught at the State University of New York in Binghamton. A native of the state of Washington she holds degrees from the University of Arkansas and the University of Tennessee. She has performed and lectured extensively in the United States with special emphasis on contemporary organ music, and has commissioned and/or premiered several works. Her reviews and articles have appeared in *The American Organist* and *The Diapason*. She is co-author with Jayson Rod Enquist of *Gardner Read: A Bio-Biography*, released by Greenwood Press in June, 1996.

MARILYN DOWNES has been a full time district manager for Schulmerich Bells in the six New England states since 1986. She has been Director of Music at the First Baptist Church in Westwood, Massachusetts, since 1960, where she directs a multiple choir program for adults and youth. Her performing handbell choir, The Westwood Ringers, has made one recording, and performs numerous concerts year round in the Boston area. She hold a B.A. degree in music from Boston University.

He holds degrees from Union Theological Seminary, Harvard Divinity School, Princeton Theological Seminary and Princeton University. In 1987 Dr. Allen was Lyman Beecher Lecturer on Preaching at Yale Divinity School. He is president of The Mercersburg Society, and serves on several boards and committees including the Schuyler Institute for Worship and the Arts, *Societas Liturgica*, the North American Academy of Liturgy, the North American Consultation on Common Texts, and the Worship Commission of the Consultation of Church Union. Dr. Allen is the author of several books and has served as a past Chaplain of the Boston Chapter, AGO.



SUSAN ARMSTRONG, AAGO, is a past dean of the Merrimack Valley Chapter AGO and a graduate of Boston University. She has studied with Anton Heiller in Austria and Michael Chapuis in France. She has performed throughout Europe, Canada and the United States and currently is artist-in-residence at Groveland Congregational Church in Massachusetts. Active as a writer, her articles have appeared in *The American Organist, The Tracker, The Diapason, The New England Organist and The North East Organist.* Ms. Armstrong's slide-show lectures on Everett Titcomb, William Johnson, "Father Johnson and the Westfield Builders," are in great demand by church and AGO groups. She has recorded on the AFKA label.



PETER BEARDSLEY, FAGO, a native of Pittsfield, Massachusetts, is Organist/Choirmaster at Christ Church Cathedral (Episcopal) in Springfield where he directs a large and active music program. Prior to his position in Springfield, he served at First United Methodist Church in Pittsfield, and worked for the late organ builder Rock Spencer. Mr. Beardsley holds degrees from Indiana University where he studied with Oswald Ragatz. Known for the wide variety of his repertoire, Mr. Beardsley has performed music from the pre-Baroque to the avant-garde to his own transcriptions of music from the movies and other sources.



THE BERKSHIRE BACH SOCIETY was founded in 1990 as a sequel to Simon Wainrib's lecture series at the Schweitzer Center on "The World of Bach Cantatas." The society's goal is an exploration of Bach's legacy through study and performance. The society has developed its own chorus, the Berkshire Bach Singers, under the guidance of Penna Rose and its own instrumental group, The Berkshire Bach Ensemble, founded by Kenneth Cooper. It has produced over 30 cantatas and choral works, 6 organ concerts, a large sampling of chamber music, and performances of the "Saint John Passion" and the "Mass in B Minor."



M. JENNIFER BLOXAM, Associate Professor of Music at Williams College since 1986, regularly teaches a course devoted to the music of J. S. Bach. She earned a B.Mus. degree at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana and a Ph.D. in Musicology at Yale. Her research on early music has appeared in a variety of academic journals and books, and she has won several fellowships and grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Fulbright Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation. Ms. Bloxam lectures widely in this country and abroad on the history of early music, specializing in music of the medieval and renaissance periods.

LLOYD E. CAST, JR. is Organist and Choirmaster at the Cathedral of All Saints, Albany. He holds a bachelor's and a master's degree in organ performance from Indiana University, School of Music. He has been a member of the Training Courses Committee of the Royal School of Church Music in America and for several years served as its Executive Director. He is a founding member of the Association of Anglican Musicians, past dean of the Bloomington, Indiana and Albany chapters of the AGO and adjunct Professor of Organ for the University of New York at Albany.
